

## sea monkey baby hat by Kelly McClure

This cheeky little hat is adored by babies and their parents, too! Using a ball of dishcloth cotton is economical, machine washable and the fibre is gentle on baby's noggin. Plus, the little ears are just so darn cute!

This hat is knit from the bottom to the crown with a worsted weight cotton. The top seam is either sewn up or grafted together. The ears are formed with the corners and cinched into shape. This hat has three sizes and no visible seam (there is a slightly visible seam on the garter style brim).

### The Technical Stuff

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Skill Level: Rookie-Apprentice-Virtuoso-Genius

Skills: knit, purl, grafting (optional)

Sizes: newborn (0-6 months, 6-12 months)

**Gauge:** approx 20 sts and 28 rows = 10 cm in St st on 4.5 mm as given on ball band

approx 18 sts = 10 cm in St st on 5 mm

Yarn: worsted weight dishcloth cotton

Suggested Brand: 1 ball Estelle Sudz 100% cotton 74 m per 50 g

or any "dishcloth / crafting" cotton

#### Needles:

5 mm 30 cm circs (40 cm can be used for 6-12 months size) 5 mm dpns (for grafting - dpns can also be used to knit entire hat instead of circs) *or size needed to obtain gauge* 

Other Materials: tapestry needle; stitch marker



Skill Level: Rookie-Apprentice-Virtuoso-Genius

Skills: knit, purl, grafting (optional)

Sizes: newborn (0-6 months, 6-12 months)

**Gauge:** approx 20 sts and 28 rows = 4" in St st on US 7 as given on ball band

approx 18 sts = 4" in St st on US 8

Yarn: worsted weight dishcloth cotton

Suggested Brand: 1 ball Estelle Sudz 100% cotton 80 yds per 1.75 oz

or any "dishcloth / crafting" cotton

Needles: US 8 12" circs (16" can be used for 6-12 months size) US 8 dpns (for grafting - dpns can also be used to knit entire hat instead of circs) or size needed to obtain gauge

Other Materials: tapestry needle; stitch marker



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Beginning at bottom with circs CO 52 (60, 68) sts with long-tail method (or any prefered method).

Join in the rnd being careful not to twist sts. Pm for beg of rnd. SI m throughout.

Work either Brim 1, 2, or 3 (see photo on page 1 for examples).

Brim 1 (roll): Knit 6 rnds.Brim 2 (garter): (P1 rnd, K1 rnd) twice. P1 rnd.Brim 3 (rib): K2, P2 for 4 rnds.

Change to St st (knit every st) until hat measures approx 5" (5.5", 6") from CO. For roll brim style, measure from the bottom of the roll as it lies - don't unroll it and then measure.

*Note:* It may seem tall for a baby hat, but when you make the ears, the fabric will gather and the hat will shorten.

#### Finishing:

Follow the instructions below for grafting *or* sewing.

Grafting (recommended):

This technique is a bit tricky to master, but it makes the top of the hat look completely seamless. See Resources below for help.

Transfer 26 (30, 34) sts to first dpn and the rest of the sts to second dpn. You are now ready to graft. When you are finished, leave a 10" tail to create the ear.

*Note:* If you choose to, you can skip using the dpns and graft sts together using your circs and Magic Loop style.

#### Sewing:

BO all sts and sew the seam at the top shut. Leave a 10<sup>°</sup> tail to create the ear.

*Note:* This is an easier method than grafting, but you will have a visible seam at the top of the hat.

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#### Ears:

**Step 1:** Once your seam is closed, thread the tail on your tapestry needle and insert it from the inside approx 3.75 cm / 1.5" from the corner at the top of the hat and pull through.

**Step 2:** Wrap the yarn tightly around the corner of the hat a few times, pulling the ear into shape as you go.

Step 3: Tie off.

Repeat for the second ear, attaching a piece of yarn at the same point on the opposite side.

Weave in ends (if the ends from your ears are secure, you can just pull them into the ear without weaving them).
